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Background to The "Roads Maintenance Forum"

- 16 November 2021 : Concept of a SAT RRM Workshop put together and circulated to select individuals
- 02 December 2021 : SAT initiative for a workshop RRM planning group met (1st Steering Committee)
 - February 2022 : First National Roads Maintenance Indaba took place (NDoT)
- 07 February 2022 : 2nd RRM Steering Committee met Sabita assumed leadership of creation of RMF



- 08th March 2022 : 3rd RMF Steering Committee met more role players invited
- 07 April 2022 : 1st RM Forum took place on line with new sponsors......topics agreed for discussion:
 - Systems ... Materials ... Quality ... Laboratories ... Resolutions
 - 13 panelists ... 348 delegates ... 144 others who could not attend (total registered = 505)



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17th August 2022 : SAT Eastern Region held a workshop on
"Road Maintenance: Current Standards, Best Practice & Innovation" 7 panelists ... 44 on-line delegates ... 55 in-person delegates

12th August 2022 : 4th RMF Steering Committee met









The overall objective of the RMF would be to....

- serve as a forum for the exchange of information and technologies and
- to discuss issues of strategic importance to the roads construction industry, focusing in particular on road maintenance.



The RMF should enable *wider representation* and participation from the broader roads industry, particularly urban, rural, provincial authorities, and emerging contractors.

It could also allow for *broader regional representation* through playing a facilitating role as a catalyst for *technology transfer* in the southern African region.



















Objectives of The "Roads Maintenance Forum"

Specific goals to be achieved by the RMF include:

- Providing a perspective of overarching strategic issues as it affects road maintenance;
- Promoting best practice in RM particularly training of emerging contractors;
- Co-ordination and linkage with other groupings;
- Establishment of task groups with specific national objectives;
- Provision of sufficient time for participation/discussion/advice and for social interactions;
- Dissemination of new technologies;
- Provision of a forum for acceptance of technological changes;
- Provision of a forum for interaction between theory and practice and for identification of technology development needs
